Taxes

There are many different taxes in Japan. People who work, live, and buy things in Japan pay taxes to the national government, prefecture, city, etc. Collected taxes are used for the livelihoods of people who live in Japan.

In this volume is an introduction to the main types of taxes and what to be careful of when paying taxes. Let's gain an understanding of the taxes that everyone pays.



Types of Taxes and Details

<Income Tax>

Tax paid to the national government

- Paid by those who receive money such as salary income from working, or those who make money through their own business.
- Amount paid is determined by salary income during the one year period from January 1 to December 31.
- Paid monthly from workplace salary income (withholding tax) or by filing a tax return to a tax office.
- Those with over 200,000 yen of income from a source other than their salary income also need to file a tax return.

[Words Related to Income Tax]

<Inhabitant Tax>

Tax paid to prefecture, city, etc.

- Paid by those who had an address in Japan on January 1 and had income such as salary income during the previous year.
- How much is paid is determined by salary income from January 1 to December 31 of the previous year.
- Either paid by an employer which deducts money from salary income every month or by using tax payment slips which are sent to homes by mail and paid at convenience stores, banks, etc.

<Consumption Tax>

Tax paid when buying something or using a service

• Tax of 8% or 10% paid together with payment for a product.

<Automobile Tax>

Tax paid when buying or possessing a car

 Paid at a store together with payment when buying a car.

 Around April or May of every year, a letter for payment will be sent to those who po

payment will be sent to those who possess a car. It is paid by the deadline at a bank, post office, or convenience store.

Amount changes based on the type of car.

< Vehicle Weight Tax>

Tax paid when paying for a car inspection

- Often paid when having a car checked for whether or not it can be driven safely (car inspection).
- Amount determined by vehicle weight.

< Fixed Asset Tax>

Tax paid by those who possess land, a building (house, apartment, store, etc.), or something used for a business

- Paid by those who possess land, a building, or something used for a business on January 1 every year.
- Those who possess depreciable assets used for a business must inform the government office of the area in which they live in by January 31.
- Paid using payment slips which are mailed to homes and paid at convenience stores, banks, and post offices.

Things to be careful of

- Inhabitant taxes depend on income such as salary income of the previous year from what city or town you lived in on January 1. Even if you move or return to your home country in the middle of the year, you must pay. Either pay the remaining inhabitant taxes before returning to your home country, or choose a proxy (someone who will take care of tax procedures in your place) if you are unable to pay beforehand.
- If you do not pay taxes by the deadline, or ignore tax notices if you do not have enough money, it can lead to trouble later on such as

receiving a letter of demand or being unable to renew your period of stay. Consultations regarding payment can be done at government offices or tax offices. Please make sure to pay your taxes.

Notice: Regarding specialist consultations with tax accountants

Specialist consultations with tax accountants are available at the Sendai Multicultural Center. They are held four times a year. Employees from the Tohoku Tax Accountant's Association will come to answer questions and help with problems related to taxes.

For example, you can consult about the differences between taxes in your home country and Japan, how to create a tax return, and how to pay taxes when returning to your home country. Those who own a shop in Japan, or have a job importing or exporting goods must properly file their taxes. If you have questions like these, please make good use of these specialist consultations.

As these specialist consultations are held four times a year, if you need to have a consultation right away, use the Tohoku Tax Accountant's Association's "Free Tax Consultation Service for Foreigners." It can be used for consultation any time. Download the Information for Consulting form on the website, write what you want to ask

about, and send it by email or fax. A response from the Tohoku Tax Accountant's Association will be given by email or telephone within one week. Consultation can also be done in English.

Advisor Corner "Thoughts on Taxes" Thoughts and experiences from advisors on this issue's theme

In the English-speaking world, we have an idiom which says "in this world, nothing is certain except death and taxes." I believe that taxes is a concept which is shared among all of humanity, even though we find ourselves on a planet full of strife and misunderstandings. To be honest, it isn't an incredibly fun connection to others, but at the very least people in every country have experience with taxes, and it is something which links everyone living in Japan, including non-Japanese residents.

That being said, there are differences in tax collection and systems depending on the country. For example, you must declare your income at the beginning of every fiscal year in America, and depending on your household circumstances you may have to submit dozens of pages of documents. Laws vary by state, but depending on where you live, there may be even more documents to submit. Thankfully,

filing your taxes has become a bit easier in comparison to before since you can use a computer.

On the other hand, since moving to Japan I pay income and inhabitant taxes like in America, but I don't have to submit documents every year, with taxes being automatically taken out of my paycheck. In comparison, it is an easier process. As I live as a foreigner here in Japan, I need to declare my income to the Internal Revenue Service in America so I don't get double taxed by both countries, but paperwork is easier than in America.
